BATTLEGROUNDS The Lost Community of Fazendeville

In October of 2022, WLAE broadcast its new groundbreaking documentary **Battlegrounds: The Lost Community of Fazendeville** – an emotionally harrowing story of one of the oldest Black neighborhoods in New Orleans that was razed during the Civil Rights struggles 60 years ago.

Presented by the Meraux Foundation, the hour-long, powerful documentary featured never-before-seen photos of Fazendeville, an idyllic, closely-knit St. Bernard Parish neighborhood of Black families who were forced to leave their homes in the 1960s. Families in the neighborhood were paid pennies on the dollar by the federal government to leave their homes so the land could be used for an expansion of the Chalmette National Battlefield site.




This moving and emotionally charged documentary tells the story of a self-sustaining community called "The Village" built by a free man of color named Jean Pierre Fazende in 1867. "The Village" was originally established for recently emancipated slaves before being abruptly dismantled and bulldozed 100 years later, leaving scores of displaced Black residents with no choice and no voice as they scattered to other areas of New Orleans.

A public screening of the film was held near the site of the Fazendeville village in St. Bernard Parish.







NOLA Crime Crisis

Halfway through 2022, an informal survey of nationwide per-capita murder rates shows New Orleans is on pace to reclaim its ranking as the most murderous city in the U.S. — and is leading by a considerable margin.

New Orleans had notched 145 homicides as of June 30, according to data compiled by Jeff Asher, public safety analyst for the City Council. That sets the murder rate at 36.8 per 100,000 residents. In second place is Baltimore, with a murder rate of 29.1 per 100,000 residents. Birmingham takes the third-place spot, with a rate of 28 per 100,000 residents.

Something needs to be done to address this problem and propose solutions to take back the streets and make New Orleans a safe place to work and visit once again.

In August, WLAE brought this issue to the forefront with "Nola Crime Crisis", a monthly TV series hosted by veteran journalist Norman Robinson. This program brings together political, business and civic leaders to open a dialog and discussion to aid in combating crime. Also, the show has reactions from locals and tourists voicing their questions and concerns about this important issue.

"WLAE-TV has a platform on-air and on-line that attracts a wide variety of viewers. We intend to use this platform to bring the crime issue to the forefront and hear from the leaders in our city as to proposals and remedies that will make the city a safe place to live, work and prosper."

Coping Today Welcomes Guest Stars

Coping Today, the WLAE weekly series focusing on mental health, in partnership with the University of Holy Cross Counseling Department, offers viewers weekly tips on how to cope in this ever-changing world and features interviews with various trained counseling experts across a wide scope of mental health issues. In 2022, the series had a few special guests join the program.

In April, former U.S. Public Health Service, Assistant Secretary for Health Admiral Brett Gioir, M.D. appeared on the program and discussed his role and the United States Government response to the Covid pandemic. In November, the program welcomed public TV personality, psychiatrist and author Dr. Daniel Amen to talk about brain health and the importance of healthy brains for positive moods and attitudes.





Public Service Commission Run-Off Debate

WLAE hosted the two candidates in the Runoff Race for Louisiana Public Service Commission District 3, incumbent Lambert Boissiere III, and challenger Davante Lewis. The live-streamed and televised debate, aired on the station on Wednesday, November 30th at 8pm. They debate was hosted by the Alliance for Affordable Energy, HousingLOUISIANA and Power Coalition for Equity and Justice. The Louisiana Public Service Commission regulates public utilities in the state of Louisiana. It is a powerful government body that makes real decisions about your energy bills, significantly impacting the lives of residents in our state every single day. The election was held on Saturday, December 10th.

Concert Spiritual: Saint-Domingue and New Orleans

In October, WLAE live streamed The 15th edition of Musical Louisiana: America's Cultural Heritage, copresented by The Historic New Orleans Collection and Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra, resurrects two forgotten sets of music from the 18th-century Caribbean. A selection of arias will highlight the short, brilliant career of Minette Ferrand, the first title-role soloist of color in the history of French opera. The concert will also feature a 1763 Mass setting designed to be sung for and by enslaved people. Guest conductor Pedro Memelsdorff spent over a decade researching this music, which has rarely been performed.

The concert is being edited for television broadcast in 2023.





Fats Domino Record

WLAE was fortunate to tape the last Fats Domino concert at Tipitina's music club on May 19, 2007 for the documentary film, *Fats Domino – Walkin' Back to New Orleans*. Tipitina's Record Club made that live recording into a vinyl record in 2022. (Yes...vinyl records are making a comeback) The album features such hits as Blueberry Hill, Ain't That A Shame and Shake, Rattle & Roll. WLAE was honored to be a part of this historical concert and recording with the great Fats Domino. Thanks to Tip's for including us in the project!
